"Application has been made at the Bureau of Buildings and Combustibles for permission to erect a church in Chili Avenue near Hobart Street, to be known as the St. Augustine Roman Catholic Church. The building will be of brick and stone and will combine a church and school. The application was made by Rev. John H. O'Brien, as rector.

The building, according to the petition, is to be forty-four feet wide, 116 feet long, and twenty-eight feet in height and its estimated cost is \$30,000. Joseph Oberlies is the architect.

St. Augustine's Church was started as a mission from St. Patrick;'s Cathedral. The mission chapel a few weeks ago was considerably damaged by fire. Instead of repairing the chapel, it was decided to build a new church. Work will be begin immediately, although it is not expected that the building will be ready for occupancy until spring.

The St. Augustine parish is in one of the most rapidly growing districts of the city being near the Lincoln Park industrial center. It was so successful as a mission that it was decided to make it an independent church. Rev. John H. O'Brien, one of the Cathedral priests, has been acting as rector and will probably be continued as such. source *Catholic Journal*, Friday Oct. 19, 1906, front page.

"Ground has already been broken for the new church of St.

Augustine's parish which is to be erected at the corner of Chili Avenue and Hobart Street. The building will be a combination school and church, and the estimated cost of the building with the furniture is \$35,000. Work is being rushed and its is planned to have the church ready for dedication on Easter Sunday. Rev. John H. O'Brien has recently been appointed rector of the congregation.

The building will be 56 feet by 114 and the first floor will be devoted to the school. There will be six large school rooms with detached toilets in the rear. Special attention has been paid to the lighting and ventilation of these rooms, the most modern and up-to-date ideas being used, and indeed, this feature will be one of special note throughout the building.

The second floor will be devoted to a chapel or church auditory which will be approached by four large staircases, two in the front from the right and left and two in the rear the same way. The seating capacity of the auditorium will be 650. The building will be constructed of mottled buff clay brick with white Medina stone trimmings. The renaissance style of architecture will be used and it is expected when the building is finished it will be one of the handsomest Catholic churches in the city. Special attention has been paid to the groupings of the windows with the result that the church and school will have an unusual amount of sunlight. The architect is Joseph H. Oberlies. Cornerstone of new St. Augustine's laid by Bishop Hickey "The cornerstone of the new church and school building of St. Augustine's parish was laid Sunday afternoon by Bishop Hickey. The Bishop was assisted by Rev. Michael J. Nolan, D.D., chancellor of the diocese, Rev. John H. O'Brien, rector of St. Augustine's; Rev. C.R. Fischer and Rev. George V. Burns of the Cathedral, and Rev. Orestes Canali, of Italian church and students of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary also assisted. Despite the inclement weather, not only nearly all members of St. Augustine's parish, but an immense number of others had gathered to witness the imposing ceremonies. The ceremonies conducted, the clergy and people entered the old church, where Bishop Hickey preached an eloquent sermon. He referred to the fact that eight years ago, when the cornerstone of the little wooden church was laid a blizzard was raging, but this could not deter the throng of people who were present. The elements had no influence on the deep interest of the people who were bound to have a church in this remote part of the city. St. Augustine's parish was established eight years ago in the extreme western part of the city, which was at that time but sparsely inhabited. But a few families at first belonged to the parish which as conducted as a mission of the Cathedral. The school was immediately begun as with twenty-one pupils. The priests in charge at various times were Rev. George V. Burns, Rev. Philip Golding and Rev. J.F. O'Hern. In two years it was necessary to enlarge the church building. The new building will be constructed of mottle brick with stone trimming, two stories high. The lower story will be used a s a school and the upper as a church. The seating capacity in the church will be 600 and the school will be arranged for nine grades. The cost of the building and inside furnishings is estimated at \$40,000. If the weather is favorable it is expected that the church will be ready for dedication in May. Rev. John H. O'Brien, the rector, has full charge of the work and will push it with all possible speed.

"The building to be used as a church and school by the members of St. Augustine's parish is now completed. It is a two story structure located on Chili Avenue, opposite Post Street and is constructed after the model in vogue in this diocese.

Prior to the dedication of the church the members of the parish decided to use the structure as a hall in which to hold a fair. With this end in view those in charge have been working for the last eight months to make the undertaking a success. The fair will open next Monday evening and will continue for the remainder of the week.

The various societies connected with the church will be in charge of a number of beautifully decorated booths in which all sorts of fancy articles will be sold. The basement and the upper floors of the building will be in use. It is promised that the decorations will be a surprise and that there will be some features that will make those who may attend stare in bewilderment.

Every evening during the week there will be a special musical entertainment. The programme will be changed every night. Some of the best musical and dramatic talent of this city will be seen at the various performances.

The sermon was preached by Bishop McQuaid. It was a stirring appeal to

the people and pastor to work together for the common good. The people were complimented on the erection of the beautiful building.

In the evening at 7:30 o'clock there were solemn vespers. Rev. J.F. O'Hern of the Cathedral was celebrant, with Rev. A.A. Hughes of Geneseo as deacon and Rev. D. J. Quigley of Canandaigua. Those in the sanctuary were: Rev. J.H. Sinclair, D.D., Rev. M. Nolan, D.D., Rev. G.V. Burns, Rev. M.J. Krieg, Rev. John B. Sullivan, Rev. George J. Jones, and Rev. Lewis O'Hern, O.P., of Nashville, Tenn.

Bishop Hickey preached the sermon, in which he said: "I place high on a pedestal that man who does God's work most perfectly. Such a man was born more than 1,500 years ago, and his name has always been interesting, but it should be of especial interest to the members of this church, for it

was Augustine.

"The work of education and religious instruction will be carried on here under the guidance of God, and will be watched over during all of the coming years by St. Augustine. Do you not see more than display in all of the beautiful ceremonies of the Catholic religion? The first church was founded on a rock. It was hollowed out in the city of Bethlehem. "For nearly three centuries the Church of God was almost hidden from sight, but it was the same church that it is to-day. It has not always been under the sunshine. More often it has been like the frail bark on the sea, expected every moment to be submerged. But Jesus has been with the church all of these years.

"The church of to-day is more elegant; but the church itself has never changed. Like the tree that years and time have made larger, the church has changed in appearance; but it is the same church as of old. "Man's one work in this world is to develop his spiritual self. The history of the church should e an inspiration on this most inspiring occasion. The material part of the church is beautiful, but it is not as beautiful as the spiritual. This building will be a nursery for your children. Every time they come here their young minds will be filled with the truth of God. "May God bless both pastor and people and may St. Augustine guide every one to the home that has been prepared for you."

"Dedication of Offshoot of Cathedral Parish May Be on St. Augustine's Day in August—Bishop Hickey Reviews History"

"The laying the cornerstone of the new St. Augustine's Church in Chili avenue Sunday afternoon began with a procession from the old church building to the new one led by the Rev. Arthur A. Hughes and the Rev. John P. Brophy.

Priests who were present included the Rev. J. Francis O'Hern, the Rev. John O'Brien, pastor of St. Augustine's, and the Rev. Edward Lyons, assistant pastor, the Rev. William Stauder, the Rev. John Sullivan, the Rev. John Bresnihan and the Rev. Patrick McArdle of Scottsville.

In his address, Bishop Hickey reviewed the history of the parish. He celebrated first mass in the old church 25 years ago, established at that time as an offshoot of the Cathedral parish. The parish was formed at that time to accommodate about 60 families, largely on account of the long distance the children had to go from their homes in the Chili avenue district to the Cathedral.

The architecture of the building is of Gothic design. The altar is made from Botticino marble. Nave, aisles and chapel are parallel

with the sanctuary and are separated from the main body of the church by high arched columns of brick topped by dark beams to the ceiling. The pulpit and the sanctuary are made of brown oak and the screens that divide the main part of the church from the narthex are of quartered oak. Above the sanctuary hangs a strikingly beautiful wood crucifix, given by Miss Kathleen Mayne, the figure being outlined against the myriad-colored windows has the figure of St. Augustines as its central motif and is the gift of the men of the congregation." source: *Catholic Journal*, Fri. "Sunday, February 1, is the date set for the dedication of the new St. Augustine's Roman Catholic Church in Chili avenue by the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, bishop of the diocese of Rochester.

As the days pass the interior of the church, lovely in its simplicity, and harmonious in every detail, comes nearer and nearer to completion. To pass from the sunlight of the street to the soft twilight of the church, shot with the warm crimson, purple and amber rays from the tall windows, is to forget, for a time, all the bustle and cheapness of modern life and catch, for at least a brief interval, a new sense of the eternal verities which lie behind all religious faith.

Seen from the organ-loft at the rear, the church stretches away in a long Gothic nave with the aisles and the chapels, parallel to the sanctuary, separated from the main body of the church by high arched columns of brick from which rise the dark wood beams of the ceiling. Above the sanctuary hangs a strikingly beautiful rood crucifix, given by Miss Kathleen Mayne, the figure being outlined against the myriad-colored window above the altar. This window has the figure of St. Augustine as its central motif and is the gift of the men of the congregation."

Altar of Botticino Marble

Below the window is the main altar of Botticino marble with its simply carved oak canopy and the rich dossal cloth in gold and terra cotta. This altar, which is a new note in church architecture in Rochester, although it embodies an old tradition of the Roman Catholic Church, is given by Mrs. Frank Doud in memory of her son, William Wiley Doud, who was killed in the World War only a few hours before the proclamation of the armistice. The altar crucifix and the carved candelabra, which are the only furnishings of the altar, have been given by Mr and Mrs. Frank O'Connor. The sanctuary is floored with Tennessee marble and has a communion rail of wrought-iron topped with oak, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. William Hickey. The altar canopy was given by Mr. and Mrs.

Michael Fitzgerald.

The altars to the right and left of the sanctuary are also of Botticino marble, that on the left, given by Rosemary and Kathleen White in memory of their parents, having a very exquisitely carved statue of the Virgin Mary, while that on the right, given by Mr. and Mrs. George Fromm and family, has a statue of St. Joseph. Other similar altars have been given by Miss Mary McCabe, Miss Alice Quinn, and Mr. and Mrs. William Leahy.

Mellow brown oak has been used for the pulpit and the sanctuary furniture, the former the gift of Mr. and Mrs. J. Edwin Sullivan and the latter by Mrs. Catherine McIntee. The screen which divides the body of the church from the narthex is of quartered oak, and even the clock which hangs against the screen is of oak. This clock was the gift of George Schaefer.

The lighting of the church is extremely artistic and churchly. Quaint, old-fashioned lanterns of yellow glass and bronze protect electric bulbs of sufficient strength to give adequate light without glare. These light the nave, while above the sanctuary hangs a beautifully wrought bronze lamp, the gift of Mrs. George Brayer and family.

Work of Rochester Artisans

The Rev. John H. O'Brien, pastor of the church, who has devoted himself to the working out of every detail of the plan suggested by the architects, Arnold and Stern of this city, is very proud of the fact that the church is the product of the artistic genius of Rochester firms and individuals. The windows, which were designed by the Butler Stained Glass Company, Inc., of this city, follow a definite color scheme, each window having a similar background but carrying an individual central motif. The richness of their coloring is beyond description, they glow and scintillate, but are never too brilliant even with the full light of the sun behind them.

The large window in the choir loft, corresponding to the sanctuary window, was given by the Rosary Society. It is in three panels, with a central motif of St. Cecelia with two attendant angels. On the left side of the church the windows are as follows: St. Jude, given in memory of Louis [sic] Staub; St. Matthew, in memory of Anthony Ryan; St. Bartholomew, in memory of Mrs. A.L. Brayer; St. James, Minor, in memory of Whiley and Mary Hawthorne; St. John, in memory of William Wiley Doud; and St. James, Major, in memory of John and Margaret Bond.

As, in the centuries long gone, master workmen put their souls as well as their physical selves into the erection of a great church, so one feels that the men of Rochester who have had their part in building this beautiful edifice have had more than a passing commercial interest in it and have left forever enshrined within it something of themselves. Planned by a Rochester architect, built by

Rochester contractors and beautified by Rochester artisans, it is something of which every resident of Rochester may be truly proud and which will grow in beauty as it mellows with age and becomes hallowed with associations."
