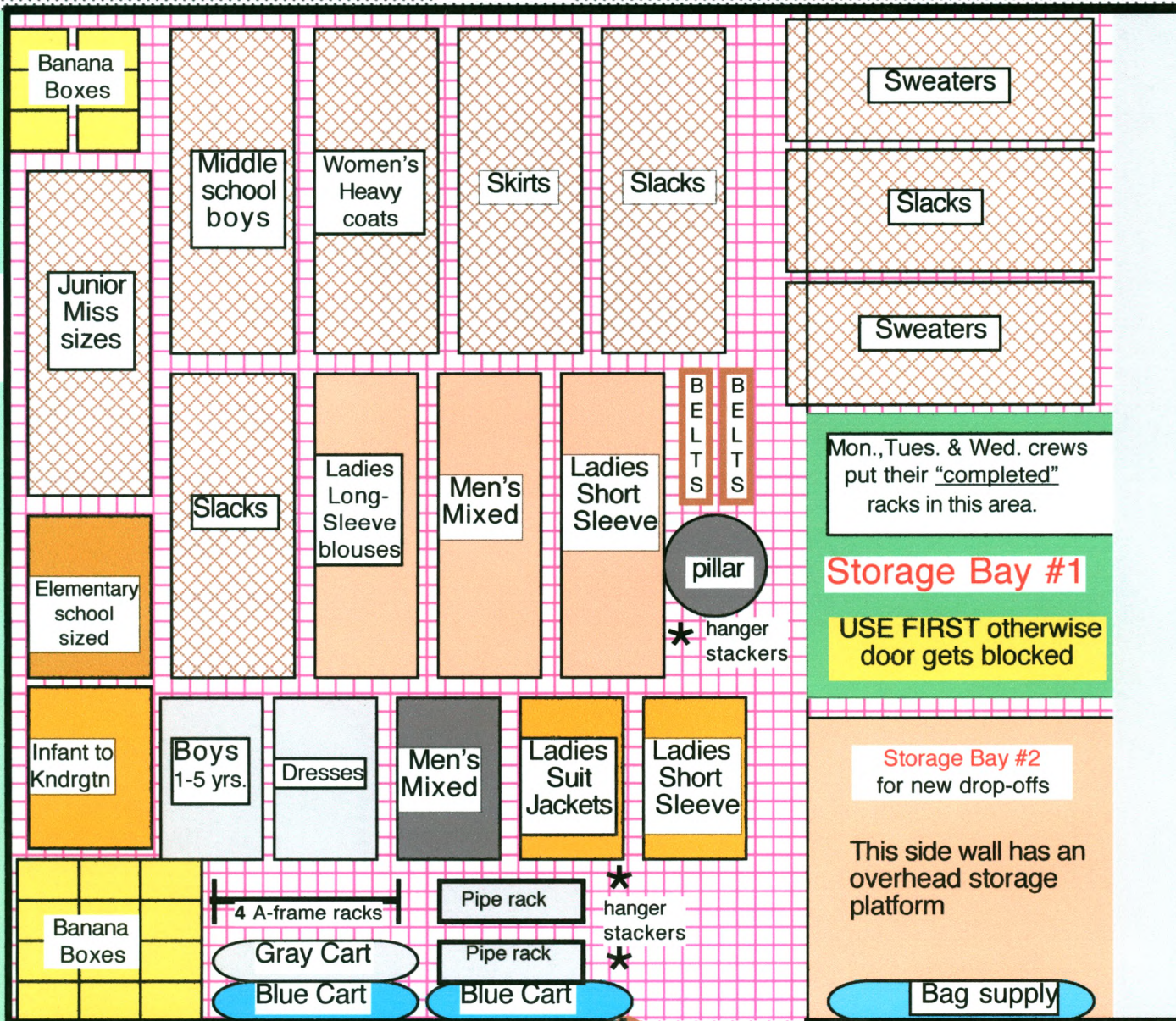




# PriceLess Clothing storage room: floor plan & usual arrangement of stored racks and boxes

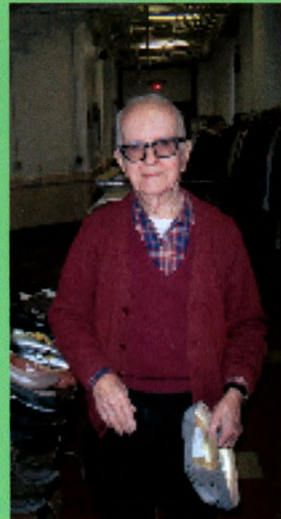

## *The Sunday Table Ministries of Saints Peter & Paul*

- ♦ *St. Paul's Table*
- ♦ *The Hospitality Table*

*St. Paul's Table* is an extension of the food ministry of Saints Peter and Paul Parish. It helps to bridge the weekend gap when St. Peter's Kitchen is closed. Donated baked goods are gathered nearly every day from local supermarkets by volunteers coordinated by Tony DiGiovanni using their own transportation resources. Borrowing from the Italian tradition of the Saint Joseph's Table, this parish ministry reaches out to family and neighbors in a spirit of generosity and hospitality.

This ministry distributes packaged bread, pastry and donuts at the conclusion of Sunday Mass along the southeast perimeter inside the church. It begins with a prayer circle in the large gathering space near the vestibule. It links parishioner and guest as one congregation. The Eucharistic Communion flows naturally into a common union. Guests work alongside parishioners at the long table as the baked goods are then shared in a respectful and dignified manner.

*The Hospitality Table* provides an opportunity for the congregation consisting of parishioner and guest to mingle together in an open and relaxed manner. It is a welcome contrast to the rushed departure from Sunday worship service that affects many churches. The Hospitality Table occupies the opposite side of the gathering space. It gives people an opportunity to have a light continental breakfast consisting of a beverage and a donut or cookies. The Hospitality Table enriches parish life by giving people a rare opportunity to socialize and share ideas. It promotes the face-to-face exchange of ideas regarding parish life. Parish goals and objectives can be explained informally, volunteers recruited and feedback gained. The social fabric of the parish is reinforced as parishioners get an opportunity to support each other and meet neighborhood guests.

St. Paul's Table and the Hospitality Table occur simultaneously. They require teams of workers to carry them out respectively. From beginning to end, at least a half hour of socializing and sharing takes place. Both Tables serve an important leadership development role as new parishioners and guests take responsibility for sharing both bread and kind words. Family groups are especially welcome as host and guest.

*St. Joe on the Go* refers to the name of an informal outreach ministry made possible by the surplus of donated baked goods gathered by the volunteers coordinated by Saints Peter and Paul parish. At the completion of the St. Paul's Table bread distribution, surplus baked goods are gathered and then driven over to St. Joseph's House of Hospitality on South Avenue, hence the name "*St. Joe on the Go*". The donations are either used directly at St. Joseph's House of Hospitality for their guests or they are distributed further by the group *Food Not Bombs*.

The good stewardship of local supermarkets and the dedicated hard work of Saints Peter & Paul volunteers generate a bounty of donated baked goods which are shared. The parish's weekday ministry, St. Peter's Kitchen, is also a regular beneficiary. The Hospitality Table also sets aside a tray of donuts and cookies providing a hospitality opportunity for the congregation of Pastor Powell which shares our worship space Sunday afternoons.
