

Dear Church Family:

Peace! I hope and pray this communication finds you well. The purpose of this insert is to summarize the major points of our visioning day and to reflect on where we go from here. Both Father Tomasso and myself were very encouraged by the number of people that attended the event. It shows that the people of Ss. Peter and Paul's Church (this means you) care deeply about their future.

Before I present the highlights of the visioning day, allow me to restate the importance of having a vision. We all want God to act in our lives. We all want our church to be vital. We all want our parish to thrive. However, if we want God to act powerfully in our lives we must bring our dreams, our hopes and our aspirations into the equation. God can only work in our lives to the extent that we give Him/Her the space to intervene in our affairs. Voicing our heartfelt dreams gives God something with which to work. It allows God to move with us and through us. In other words, having a clearly defined vision for the parish invites God to be God in our lives.

As people presented their vision for the parish, we placed their concepts into four specific categories. These categories were defined by the Strategic Plan developed by our parish and the parishes in our geographic area (Immaculate Conception Church, the University of Rochester Newman Center, and the Roman Catholic Community of the 19th Ward). These categories are Evangelization, Education, Social Justice Ministry, and Finances-Building and Grounds. We added another category called "Other" for those suggestions that did not fit into the just mentioned classifications. In this insert, the focus is going to be on evangelization. Listed below are the summaries of people's visions relative to the ministry of evangelization:

- 1) Outreach to Fairchild.
- 8) Evangelizing our young people/other churches.
- 2) Outreach to Main Quest.
- 9) Improve communication with past members.
- 3) Encourage/train individuals for evan. 10) Advertise accessibility of church.
- 4) Micro enterprise ministry. ?
- 11) Share with other faith communities/cultures.
- 5) Publicize mass times.
- 12) Draw local neighbors into parish.
- 6)Define mission statement & Advert.
- 13) Partnership with other churches.
- 7) Homecoming weekend (Carol Ritter's column)

The above ideas are both positive and realistic. We will begin a process of implementation after the first of the year. We can make it happen! We will see miracles in this church if we deepen our relationship with God and spread the light to others. People are hungry for love, hungry for hope, and hungry for life. All of us have a gift to share. My prayer is that others will find God in our midst. Thank you!

Peace! As I stated previously, these inserts are to summarize the ideas that we stated on our parish visioning day. This will help to keep our dreams for the parish fresh and alive. This week, the focus is on social justice. These are the vision statements you created:

- 1) Social Events for the local community.
- 2) Integrate Outreach Programs into community.
- 3) Integrate parishioners into our outreach programs.
- 4) Advertise our programs.
- 5) Encourage ownership of homes (educate).
- 6) Reduce expectation of priest.
- 7) Ministry of Reconciliation (to married priests, divorced, gays and other Christians).

It might be helpful to reflect on the meaning of social justice. The ministry of social justice is rooted in the gospel message. Jesus did not call us to love God and then ignore those in need. Rather, Jesus challenges us to see God in those that are oppressed, hungry, and marginalized by society. However, seeing God in them is not enough. Jesus challenges us to respond to their needs with compassionate action.

Our parish has a rich history of compassionate action. Our soup kitchen, our clothes ministry, and our bread distribution program are wonderful examples of compassion in action. However, we need to ask ourselves if there is more that Jesus is asking us to do? We must also avoid the belief that we are too small or too poor to do more. We need to think and act as if the very resources of heaven are at our disposal. We need to operate not out of fear, but out of love and freedom. As we seek to bless others, God will surely bless us.

I recently was asked the following question: "How are the ideas of the visioning day going to take flesh in the life of our parish?" It was a very good question. Certainly, I will provide leadership, especially as it pertains to the strategic planning process. However, a leader cannot and should make everything happen. A good leader holds the creative space that empowers others to make things happen. In other words, if you have a dream or vision for the parish step forward and make it happen. Trust yourself and your ability to listen to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit.

On a completely different note, it is with sadness that I announce that Luke Perrone Sr. has passed away. He was a faithful and loyal member of our parish. Please keep him in your prayers. His funeral will be Wednesday, at 9:30 AM. Nothing in this life last forever.

Personally, I treasure the weeks following Easter. It is as if we stand in the glory of the Risen Jesus. Hope abounds! Life emerges! Love triumphs! We catch a glimpse of what is possible. The challenge, however, is to find a way of remaining open to the light of the resurrection as the glow of the Easter season fades. In other words, we take our cues from above, from Jesus, from the light and power that flows from the resurrection experience. Specifically, this means that we learn to live in the solution, focusing on the positive that can be done. It also means that we chose to take the high road, gravitating to that which is noble, compassionate and true. Finally, it means that we embrace what is loving, what is life-enhancing, and what serves the common good. If we faithfully put these things into practice, we will know the energy of the resurrection.

Recently, I was asked "Whatever happened to the visioning day and all of those ideas?" My response was that "the visioning day is alive and well." Below is a list of what has happened in our Church, what is happening, and what is about to happen.

- -Return of Ash Wednesday(evening)Celebration -Outreach to woman & children living
- -Adult Education on Sunday Mornings.
- -Benediction Service.
- -Thursday Healing Circle.
- -Reconciliation Committee.
- -Our Homecoming Celebration

- Outreach to woman & children living in the former school
- -Plans for a parish retreat in the fall.
 - Plans for support gatherings for singles and couples.
- -Ecumenical Celebrations with local Churches (In the planning stages).


This is significant of growth in a short period of time! If you have a vision, an idea, or a dream for Saint Peter and Paul's Church, please bring it forth.

I pray that this insert finds you and your loved ones to be well and happy.

Clearly, Saints Peter and Paul's Church is experiencing a time of transition. Today we say good-by to Father Paul Tomasso. As I stated last week, he has served us well. He is a dedicated, gifted and prayerful priest. Without his clear-sighted leadership, our doors might now be closed. Thank you Father Paul. You will be in our prayers, now and in the future. We will miss you. God bless you.

To help us in our transition, I would like to suggest a number of traits or characteristics of a Church that is healthy and growing. I am not saying that my list is exhaustive, but I do think that it is a good place to begin.

- 1) First and foremost, we need to be Christ-centered. This means that we love Jesus, that we are a prayerful community, and that we attempt to live our lives in accordance with the "Gospel." If we are truely Christ-centered, the energy of God will flow out of us. When people come to Saints Peter and Paul's Church they will feel and sense the presence of God. More than anything else, our focus has to be on Christ and his message!
- 2) Our liturgy and worship needs to be prayerful, inspirational, and meaningful. This means that we need to value our preaching, our music, and our sense of the sacred. Gathering around the Lord's table should never be taken for granted. This also means that we cannot leave our liturgical celebrations entirely up to the priest. Everyone has a part to play or a gift to bring. Our voices are gifts, our prayers are gifts, and our positive ideas are gifts. For example, last Sunday one of our members suggested that we bring Mary (the Mother of Jesus) into a more prominent place relative to our Church life. I thought that was a great idea. We will work on it.
- 3) We need to be a Church that empowers people to use their gifts and to develop their leadership abilities. If people have ideas, they should feel free to express them. If people have a vision for some new ministry, they should feel free to pursue it. The Church is not primarily a building, it is the "people of God." And, the people of God are a talented and gifted group of individuals. Those gifts and talents should never go to waste.
- 4) A Church that does not serve those in need is missing an essential piece and can never really thrive. Jesus identified himself with the poor. When we serve the marginalized of our society, we serve Jesus. And, when we serve Jesus he lives in us and with us. When Jesus is in us and with us, we cannot fail.
- 5) Finally, to be Church means to have a living sense of community. Church is family, a place where people belong, a place where people feel supported, and a place where people feel welcomed. We must seek to be a " Christian Community " in the fullest sense of the term. We do not have to be perfect at it, we simply need to try.

What do you think? I would be interested in your comments.

Please remember, next week our Mass schedule shifts to 9:30 AM. I hope and pray that this change does not deter anyone from attending Mass at Saints Peter and Paul's Church.

On a personal note, every Friday I host a Catholic-Christian radio show from 1:00 PM until 1:30 PM (WWWG radio station: 1460 on the AM dial). This has nothing to do with Saints Peter and Paul's Church. I just thought you might like to know.

Dear Church Family:

As we approach the beginning of a New Year, I pray that you be filled with hope, boundless energy, and the peace of Christ!




