# My Idea

### A Future for Ss. Peter and Paul's

This beautiful structure was built in 1911 with cutting-edge steel construction and technology, but its architecture is a unique interpretation of the greatest elements of 1600 years of Italian design.

Ss. Peter and Paul's is a unique blend of architectural themes. It incorporates the design of the ancient Roman basilicas, the earliest Christian churches in Ravenna and Rome, the romanesque churches of Lombardy and an impressive vault from the Renaissance. These elements are combined to form a unique, yet coherent theme. An original element rarely seen in other churches of this type is a floor that slopes to the front. Rochesterians should be proud to have such a treasure right on main street.

Unfortunatly, the future of this historic landmark is in danger. The building is for sale and there are few interested parties. The Parish of Saint's Peter and Paul is going to discontinue worship at this location in the fall, merging with the consolidated parish at St. Monica's. Without regular use or adequate heating this building could deteriorate within a handful of years.

My idea is to convert the campus, which includes the church, the rectory and the school, into a Performing Arts and Community Outreach Center. I believe that the University of Rochester and the City of Rochester should collaborate in a joint effort to purchase and operate this facility on the west side. The new center would serve as an anchor in the neighborhood and a catalyst for revitalization. It would relieve a need for performance space, creating a world-class facility able to accommodate an audience of one-thousand. This project could also be incorporated into the Renaissance Plan, saving tax dollars.

The building you are seated in would become the focal point of the new center. This space could host concerts by the Eastman School and River Campus, serve as practice space for their musicians, and be

utilized for official functions and speakers by the University and the City. The space would also be available to various faith communities for worship services on the weekends. The historic organ in the choir loft could be restored to increase the Eastman School's organ practice and performance space while adding to their organ collection.

The rectory could host offices for local charities or university professors, and some of the rooms are large enough to serve as classrooms.

The school building could be converted to be used as studios, practice rooms and classrooms, or the building could continue to support the two non-profit organizations located within. These are Saint Peter's Kitchen, for which this concert is being held, and Fairchild Place, which offers housing to mothers in need.

I am aggressively pursuing this idea for the next two years because of my love for Italian architecture, my pride in Rochester and my hope for the future. I have been accepted into the University of Rochester's Kauffman Entrepreneurial Year Program, which gives me a fifth year, tuitionfree, to "create an enterprise that generates value". I have selected courses that will support my success. These are in the areas of history, art history, entrepreneurship in music, architecture, engineering and more. Due to the urgency of the situation, I have front-loaded my coursework so that I will be working almost exclusively on this project this year, even though it is only my fourth year at UofR.
