The plans were drawn for a two-story building, with iron E, columns in the basement. Said plans were taken from the office to be figured on by contractors. The next time he saw said plans and specifications they had been changed to conform to a three-story building, with an addition on the rear, one story high. The iron columns in the rear, one story high. basement were omitted, and the contract was awarded to the lowest bidder. For the carpenter's work he wrote a contract and obligated the firm to superintend the carrying out of its terms properly on the part of said contractors. also wrote a contract that Mr. Lauer was to do the brick work above the first floor joists, for a stipulated sum, but according to the agreement the firm were not to superintend the mason work. The first time he was called to the building, which was when the first floor of joist ere on, he suggested to Mr. Lauer that the brick piers were not strong enough, and it would be best to put on a stone of the full size of the pier, and to rest the beams on the same also to place a stone block on top of the same of sufficient size to receive the base of the iron column. He did not know till yesterday that this suggestion was not carried out. His opin-ion was that if these suggestions had been adopted the pier would have held the weight. A. J.
